5. APPROVAL – STP-L PROJECT FUNDING INCREASE REQUEST

The City of McHenry requested an additional \$142,351 in STP-L funds to cover increases of Construction and Phase III Engineering costs. The City of Woodstock's Raffel Road project received an initial partial award of \$476,373; COM is able to increase the STP award by \$827,317. Mr. Hennings made COM aware that the projects would not exceed the limit of \$1.5 million STP dollars per project. Mr. Hennings proposed the changes to COM. A motion was made by Mr. Schmitt and seconded by Mr. Eisenberg.

6. INFORMATIONAL – REDISTRIBUTION OF EXCESS STP-L FUNDS IN FFY23

Mr. Hennings explained that MCCOM staff were able through active reprogramming to increase the City of Woodstock's Raffel Road project STP-L award by \$827,317. This was in addition to the partial funding award of \$476,373.

7. APPROVAL – MCHENRY COUNTY COUNCIL OF MAYORS SURFACE TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM – LOCAL

Mr. Hennings presented the updated STP-L active program that includes the STP-L funding increase requests. A motion was made by Mr. Strange and seconded by Mr. Schmitt.

Ms. Vega made members aware that the STP Shared fund applications would open for submissions in the following weeks and to contact her or CMAP with any questions.

Ridership Update

In January, Pace carried about 1 million riders on fixed route service which was 20.6% higher than this time last year. On a typical weekday, there were an estimated 42,000 riders on fixed route service.

Systemwide, which includes fixed route service, dial-a-ride, vanpool, and paratransit, Pace carried an estimated 1.4 million riders in January. This was about 22.4% higher compared to this time last year. On a typical weekday, there were an estimated 61,500 riders systemwide.

Route 550 Proposed Routing Changes

With input and the support of both the City of Crystal Lake and McHenry County, On Monday March 6th Pace implemented a service change to our Route 550 bus through downtown Crystal Lake. The newly active route removed Route 550 service from Main Street between Pyott Road/Main Street and Virginia intersection and the intersection of Main Street and Northwest Highway. Instead, between these two intersections, Route 550 now operates via Virginia Road and Northwest Highway before rejoining with the original route path.



This is now a perfect option for local residents along the Randal Road and Virginia Road corridors to use in order to get to and from the downtown Metra station as well as the shopping and businesses districts along both Northwest Highway and Randal Road. Specifically on Virginia Road, residents of Darlington Apartments, Somerset Condominiums, and Virginia Road Condominiums now have bus stops right outside their front doors.

The new routing can also be great for downtown city residents to visit the two large grocery stores on Northwest Highway, Mariano's and Jewel Osco are both

serviced by the new stop locations.

I brought route maps and the passenger notice with full details of the new routing with me today. They are in the back of the room.

I want to again thank the City of Crystal Lake and McHenry County for bringing new alternative ideas to the table and working together with Pace to help provide increased access to public transportation within the community.

Fare Reductions and New Fare Products

Improving regional connectivity is a priority for Pace and its partners at Metra, CTA, and RTA. In addition to the new Pace/CTA unlimited-ride passes and reduced pass pricing starting Monday, February 20th, Pace passengers will ride more for less with the elimination of transfers between Pace services. Passengers transferring to Pace premium services will continue to pay a surcharge to get to the premium base fare.

"The elimination of transfer fees improves access for all by making our services more affordable and our fares more equitable," said Executive Director Melinda Metzger. "We will continue to evaluate our fares and service to meet the needs of those we serve and ensure regional connectivity."

Free transfers are valid when using Ventra within two hours of the first trip taken. A Ventra card is free after registration and allows riders to store passes and discounts and save money on each ride.

MCRide Extended Hours

Last year the County Board approved to utilize the one-time Pace 200 thousand dollar grant to extend the hours on the MC Ride Program for the 2023 calendar year. Pace is proud to report that as of 1/1/2023 the new hours of operation have taken effect. Individuals can now schedule rides between the hours of **5am – 11pm**, 7 days a week.

Seniors (60+) and individuals with disabilities can schedule a ride up to seven days in advance of their trip. Members of the general public can schedule a ride up to two days in advance of their trip.

RTA Board adopts regional *Transit is the Answer* strategic plan

On February 16th the RTA Board voted to adopt <u>Transit is the Answer</u>, the 2023 regional transit strategic plan that has been in development for more than a year. The plan offers improvements to the regional transit system and evaluates revenue options to address a projected \$730 million annual operating budget gap in 2026.

The plan's vision is "Safe, reliable, accessible public transportation that connects people to opportunity, advances equity and combats climate change." It outlines 14 key Areas of Advocacy and Action that were co-created with stakeholders to guide priorities in areas like funding, safety, speed, and reliability. The plan also identifies several actions that the RTA, Chicago Transit Authority (CTA), Metra and Pace will work together on this year, including pursuing additional funding for operations, convening a safety and security summit, exploring an expanded regional free or reduced fare program for people experiencing low incomes, and developing a regional transit climate action plan.

To implement the plan, RTA is launching a regional coalition that will help advocate for sustainable funding for transit and shape the future of the system. The coalition will meet quarterly with the ability to participate virtually. Local governments and advocates are invited to join the coalition.

RTA awards grants to help communities become more transit-friendly

The RTA Board approved the <u>2023 Community Planning Program of Projects</u> to provide funding and technical assistance to local governments to help foster the growth of sustainable, equitable, walkable, and transit-friendly communities. Highlights include supporting a community mobility center in Bronzeville near the 51st Street Green Line Station, a transit-oriented development plan for downtown Joliet, and a transportation and development study in Riverdale near two Metra stations in the South Suburbs.

Metra, CTA awarded federal funds for station accessibility

In December, the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) <u>awarded the Chicago</u> <u>region more than \$185 million</u> in federal funds to make more of the region's rail stations fully accessible to people with disabilities. The CTA received \$118.5 million to modernize its Irving Park, Belmont, and Pulaski stations and make them fully



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ADA accessible, while Metra won \$66.6 million for accessibility upgrades at 95th Street-Chicago State University and 59th/60th Street stations on the Metra Electric line. Funding came from the <u>All Stations Accessibility Program (ASAP)</u>, a new federal grant program established in the IIJA that funds accessibility improvements for legacy rail systems.

Plan of Action for Regional Transit (PART)

The development of a plan for a stronger and more financially secure transit system for Chicagoland is now underway. The outcome will be a set of state legislative recommendations that ensure the long-term financial viability of a comprehensive and coordinated regional public transportation system, as required by state law enacted last year.

To identify actionable solutions, CMAP is engaging a diverse group of stakeholders from the business, community, environmental, labor, and civic sectors, along with the public, in this process. The PART steering committee held its first meeting on January 18 and plans to convene four other times throughout 2023. The PART report also will leverage findings and input from the RTA and its Iransit is the Answer strategic plan, as well as CMAP's Mobility Recovery project.

Call for CMAQ/CRP, TAP-L, and STP Shared Fund projects

The call for projects opened on January 17, 2023. Applications are due by **March 10, 2023 at 5:00 p.m**. All Call for Projects information, including training webinars and application materials, are posted on the CMAP website at cmap.is/2023callforprojects.

CRRSAA Program

On December 27, 2020, Title IV of the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021 (CRRSAA) was enacted. This Act resulted in the allocation of \$42,647,247 to be programmed and managed by CMAP. In the fall of 2021, the STP Project Selection Committee and local councils of mayors selected 33 individual project phases for CRRSAA funding. The Regional CRRSAA Status Report and Regional CRRSAA Accounting Summary were updated in February 2023.

Surface Transportation Program

Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) and Transportation Alternatives (TAP-L)

Safe Travel for All Roadmap (STAR)

CMAP's STAR program aims to improve the region's traffic safety environment. It will continue and build on the work of the Safety Action Agenda and align the effort with new federal funding opportunities including: the development of policy related to speed management, bicycle and pedestrian safety; the creation of safety action plans for qualifying local partners, the dedication of resources to planning and implementing complete streets projects and the creation of data resources for partners to better address safety.

Northeastern Illinois was awarded a \$5 million grant to improve traffic safety across the region. The joint application submitted by CMAP, IDOT, and the region's counties will fund a comprehensive, regional program called Safe Travel for All Roadmap (STAR), which will provide a framework for safety research and programs to make northeastern Illinois safer for all travelers.

CMAP Products and Data

Greenhouse Gas Emissions Inventory and Local Summaries

An updated greenhouse gas emissions inventory using 2019 data is available. This shows that between 2010 and 2019, overall greenhouse gas emissions in northeastern Illinois decreased by 9 percent. While this is progress, the region has a shared goal of reducing emissions by 5 percent annually through 2050, and it fell 36 percent short of the goal. <u>Individualized data summaries</u> by county, community, and Chicago neighborhood that provide a snapshot of emissions from the building, transportation, and waste sectors are also available.

IIJA booklet and resources for communities

CMAP has launched an <u>online resource</u> to provide communities and partners with the essential information they need to know about IIJA and its benefits to the region. This includes funding estimates for existing transportation programs as well as new programs that can make our regional transportation system stronger and more resilient for the next generation of users.

CMAP has also been working with partners and stakeholders to prioritize and achieve consensus around sustainable solutions to our region's transportation challenges. The highest priority projects for the region are reflected in the IIJA booklet. These projects align with the core principles that guide IIJA and our region — inclusive growth, resilience, and prioritized investment.

From Our Partners

Build America, Buy America (BABA) Act

As part of the IIJA, the Build America, Buy America (BABA) Act was expanded beyond what was previously required only for steel/iron products, to now include a list of construction materials also required to be manufactured in the United States. These requirements will commence with the January 20, 2023 letting. To assist in facilitating these new requirements, IDOT has created a "List of Construction Materials Subject to Build America, Buy America (BABA)," which is available on the IDOT's website. This list will be updated as more information becomes available from the USDOT.

Funding Opportunities

Invest in Cook

The Cook County Department of Transportation and Highways (DoTH) has announced a 7th round of Invest in Cook, an \$8.5 million grant program to help local governments and agency partners further their transportation projects by covering some of the cost of planning and feasibility studies, engineering, right-of-way acquisition and construction associated with transportation improvements. Applications are due by **5 p.m. on Friday, March 17, 2023**. Additional information can be found here.

Statewide Planning and Research Funds (SPR)

On February 24, 2023 IDOT issued <u>Circular Letter 2023-07</u> announcing the FY 2024 SPR Call for Projects. Funding must be used for planning and research activities, and all proposed projects should be related to studying or implementing a goal, strategy, or objective within the state's Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) or one of its associated plans, implementing performance-based program development, implementing asset management or benefiting a disadvantaged/economically distressed community. An informational <u>webinar</u> will be held on March 15 from 10:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. and applications are due before midnight on **March 30, 2023**. Federally-Funded Project Implementation and Active Program Management Reminders – March and early April 2023

3/6/2023

Final Agreements and ROW documents due for projects targeting the April state letting.

Final PS&E and Draft Agreements due for projects targeting the June state letting.

3/10/2023

All applications for the STP Shared Fund, CMAQ/CRP, and TAP-L projects must be submitted in eTIP by 5:00 p.m. to receive funding consideration.

3/15/2023

All ROW must be certified by the Bureau of Land Acquisition for projects targeting the April state letting.

3/30/2023

CMAQ and TAP-L project change requests for projects targeting the **June** or **August** state lettings are due for consideration at the April 13th Project Selection Committee meeting.

3/31/2023

Quarterly status updates for all projects funded with CMAQ, CRRSAA (local or shared), STP (local or shared), and/or TAP-L funds are due to transportation@cmap.illinois.gov or your council of mayors (for STP-Local only).

4/14/2023

Pre-final plans due for projects targeting the **September** state letting.

Project sponsors should be reviewing the status of STP-funded (local or shared fund) project phases and reviewing the recently updated Active Program Management <u>policies</u> to determine if an obligation deadline extension may be needed and if the project phase is eligible for an extension.
